THE MINISTER'S LETTER

My dear friends,

As I sat down yesterday to start this letter, the outcome of the US presidential election was still to be declared. Would Senator Obama or Senator McCain be victorious? Whatever the result, there would be a 'first': a first non-white President, or a first female Vice-President.

Now, on Wednesday morning, the result is thankfully clear. Not only that, but Mr McCain was gracious in defeat – even chastising some of his audience who started to boo at the announced result. My prayers are for President-elect Obama and his advisors, as they start to put together a team which will govern the United States for the next four years.

Then, I notice that last month I wrote about the beginning of the UK and US financial crisis, as banks failed and were bailed out. Now the crisis has been revealed as a truly global one: Japan, China, continental Europe (and Iceland), Russia – even some of the oil-rich states are all feeling the pinch. It's all down, we are told, to institutions lending money that they didn't have, and borrowing money they couldn't afford from other institutions which apparently didn't have it anyway.

Which leads me to ask, what actually *is* money? To you and me on one level, it's the coins in our pockets and purses, and bits of paper saying "I promise to pay the bearer..." and that works because we trust the Bank of England and the US Treasury and so on. But what about the Bank of Zimbabwe, whose dollar in 1980 would have bought a British pound note and today will buy a hundredth of a penny?

The promise on those bank notes is worthless: *real* money, we are told, is little electrons whizzing along wires from one continent to the next. "Such things are too high for me: I cannot understand them!" (Psalm 139: 6)

So much of our civilisation today is about trust. Trust that our politicians will be true to the promises they made before they were elected; trust that the banks and building societies will take care of our money (whatever money is!); trust that our emergency services will come when we dial 999; trust that our neighbour will be a true neighbour if we ask him for help.

In all of these, your experience – as mine – may be patchy. In some: neighbours, ambulance service, for example, I have nothing but praise. In others I have my reservations. The Psalmist had similar thoughts, when he wrote "Put not your trust in princes" (Ps 146:3), and he goes on in later verses, "the Lord loves the righteous, ...but frustrates the way of the wicked"

Which brings us back to our opening paragraph, strangely enough. For the official motto of the US is "In God we trust"!

Let us commit to the Lord not only the President-elect, but his advisors, the bankers, and all who serve us. For if prayer is needed at any time, it is now.

Mother Teresa was so moved by these verses she had them placed upon a wall of Shishu Bhaven, her orphanage in Calcutta, India. Through no fault of Mother Teresa, they are widely and inaccurately attributed to her. The verses actually were written by Kent

Keith in a motivation booklet for high school counselors published while he was a student at Harvard in 1966.



“It is well with my soul”

Peace starts with the knowledge that our sin has been paid for in full; that therefore nothing can come between us and God; that nothing can make Him love us less. We know that we have an eternal hope in Him, and so we gain a new perspective on all of life’s problems. No matter what storms rage against us, no matter what trials should come, we know that God will save us out of them all. We look through the storms to the day when all storms will cease, when clouds will no longer herald tempests and hurricanes but will usher in Christ in His glorious return. One day the trumpet will sound, the Lord will descend and we will be with Him forever more. Tears and heartaches will cease, and sorrow and sighing will fade away. Then it will be **truly well with our souls.**

During the war in 1944 both Alice and her sister, Ruth, were evacuated to St. Helens in Lancashire where their Auntie Gertie encouraged Alice, then 10, to play her violin.

Alice was gifted with her hands in sewing and knitting. She learnt Latin “O” level in 9 months and passed Grade VIII with distinction on the violin, eventually attending the Royal College of Music at 17 years. She was also a natural leader and organiser, and when Billy Graham came to London on a mission, Alice organised prayer meetings in her home in Colindale. At this time she also started helping with Sunday afternoon hospital services in the wards of Edgware Hospital.

Alice then began attending Camrose Baptist Church evening services, as it was too late to get back to The Hyde Church in Colindale for evening service, which led to Alice being baptised there, becoming a full Church Member being supported by them as their Missionary for the rest of her life.

Evangelism and witnessing to others was a natural part of her Christian life, going to France to join the summer team evangelising in the villages in French. This led to Bible training in French at the European Bible Institute near Paris, offering to serve overseas with the Overseas Missionary Fellowship (OMF).

ALICE COMPAIN – 1934 – 2008

As some of you will already be aware Alice Compain passed away recently.

Alice was born to a French Father and Swiss Mother and grew up in a multi-cultural Christian home. She was for many years a member at our Hyde Church, attending both Sunday School and the Girls Life Brigade, where she was very much influenced by the life and witness of the Company Captain, Cap Ganderton.

Alice evangelised in Laos using her music to produce a Lao hymnbook, then in 1973 was invited to join the small group of OMF members to Cambodia for reaping and training converts before the Khmer Rouge took over. Here Alice taught French and learnt Khmer. Evacuated from Cambodia with no time for farewells to her Cambodian friends, it was back to Laos, where she was

again evacuated. Alice also worked with Cambodian refugees in Thailand.

In 1989 foreign workers were once again able to go into Cambodia. Alice took her violin becoming a teacher at the university of Fine Arts in Phnom Penh, being the first OMF worker to return back to the country. Alice's ministry continued in Cambodia, occasionally visiting Laos, eventually being granted the rare honour of Cambodian citizenship in June 2005.

It is due mainly to Alice that the Cambodian and Lao churches can sing the praises of God not only in their own languages but also in their own native music forms. Her dedication to music was great.

For those who knew Alice, we can truly say she was a shining light to the people where her evangelism and mission gave hope to all who were living under the threat of war and persecution for most of their lives.

During the Second World War, parts of Birmingham suffered severe bombing. One morning after a particularly bad night only a few teachers and children gathered in the school assembly hall. The headmaster asked if anyone had a favourite hymn. A small boy's hand shot up. "Please can we have:

‘Glad that I live am I?’

.....

When I was in New York I went to see 'Ground Zero' with my friend. It is hard to imagine that there was once twin towers where now there is only a building site, with cranes and diggers everywhere.

Most of the memorabilia which was attached to the fencing immediately after the attack has now disappeared and is located in the little St. Paul's Chapel right opposite the site.

We went into the Chapel, which quite amazingly suffered not even a broken window from the blasts and only the great tree outside fell protecting the whole area. This was a place to remember with all the devastation and suffering. Much was written about this disaster and amongst which was the following poem:-

This Remembrance Day we will reflect on those who gave their lives for our country, whether a loved one, friend or the countless others who were lost.

**“They shall grow not old,
as we that are left grow old:
Age shall not weary them
nor the years condemn.
At the going down of the sun**

ST. PAUL'S CHAPEL

**It stood. Not a window broken.
Not a stone dislodged.
It stood when nothing else did.
It stood when terrorists brought
September down.
It stood among myths.
It stood among ruins.**

To stand was its purpose, long lines prove that.
It stands and around it now,
a shrine of letters, poems, acrostics, litter of the heart.
It is the standing people want:
To grieve, serve and tend
