THE MINISTER’S LETTER

My dear friends,

Early this month, three representatives from The Hyde URC and the Chinese Church will meet as the Joint Church Council, to consider our ministry and our use of the buildings. It was Roger, I think, who thought of the title for our weekly notice sheet “The church at the centre of Colindale”, but while this is factually correct – at least *geographically* – I wonder how much we are at the centre of *the community*. Please hold the members of the Council in your prayers: in the case of the URC they are Maria, Chris, Jim and our Moderator.

I hope that, as we get used to “living together” and working together, we will find ways of truly being “The church at the centre...”

I have now passed the fifth anniversary of my induction into the ministry here. During those five years there have been a few changes, some more noticeable than others. The new buildings are of course very obvious; but the change and growth of the congregation and membership perhaps not so obvious. For example, last Sunday, Cathy was at the piano and able to count the congregation. With about twenty ‘regulars’ missing and accounted for, and a few ‘extras’ in church, there were 34 people present. From memory (which is admittedly not very good in someone my age) that was the average congregation five years ago. The growth has been almost imperceptible, but certainly has happened and is continuing.

The ethnic makeup of the church has also changed, too. Those 34 people represented twelve nationalities. I hope that we can claim that this reflects a welcoming church: one in which all who come are loved and accepted.

So, we’re growing *in numbers*; are we growing *spiritually*? I know I’m banging a familiar drum, but *what do we want for our church?* Do we just want a pleasant religious club to which we come for an hour or two on Sundays? Or do we want a place where we can all *grow in Christ*?

This is tied up with something I preached about in August: that in our tradition, and in the tradition of any growing church since New Testament times, it was not just the minister, not even just the Elders, but the whole of the people of the Church who shared in the proclamation and the sharing of the Gospel... and they did this from a basis of close fellowship with each other.

How can we develop this fellowship? In a month or two we will be challenged to do this in the process of *Vision4Life*. Perhaps our fellowship with the Chinese Church will throw up other ways – for example in the way we minister to the children and young people in our membership. But our thought processes should also be guided by – you’ve got it – the whole of our membership.

Finally, **our buildings**.

During the next week or two, a few of us will be walking round the new parts of our premises with clip boards, for we have to report to the builders with any snags we find. If you have spotted something that “isn’t quite right”, and which should be rectified before we sign the buildings off and make our final payment to the builders, will you please see (or preferably give a note to) Roger or me. We can then get the problem dealt with.

I hope that your holiday break – if you were able to take one – was joy-giving and life-enhancing!

The afternoon will end with a short time of worship and prayer from 6.00– 6.30 p.m. –to unite all the prayers of the day and dedicate them to God. Following that, after a suitable break, you are invited to attend the Harvest Supper Social Evening at 7.00 p.m.

The focus will continue on Sunday as we come together at 10.00 a.m. for our Harvest Festival Service, which this year is being led by the Elders.

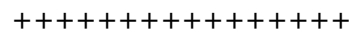
**Sorrow vanquished,

PROJECT POTS


